REMEMBERING ESPERANCE: A FULL HOUSE OF HISTORY AND LAUGHTER

We're so grateful to our guests, performers, and Willard Martin for helping bring Remembering Esperance to life on Saturday, August 23.

It was a wonderful afternoon; a full house, stories of our village's history, and more than a few good laughs along the way. And if you were there, you'll remember: "We have ____ in our museum." From bottles to farm equipment... if you know, you know!

The play was originally written in 1970 by Dorothy Edwards, the first permanent President of the Historical Society. The story centers on neighbors reminiscing about life in the 1930s, while also recalling tales passed down from the turn of the century. To keep it fresh, Willard Martin added updates that connected the script to 2025. A thoughtful blend of past and present, and if you're trying to keep track, yes, it covered four different time periods!

The cast featured Linda Feuz as Dorothy Edwards, Sarah Grantier as Inez Frisbee, Verelyn Robertson as Flora VanNatta, Matthew Worcester as Kent Frisbee, Jr., Venus Louise as Adah Rockwell and Florence Montanye, Sharon Aikenson as Alice Markle, Sarah Worcester as Lorena Eckart, Rachel Jeffers as Grace Easton, Sarah Goodrich as Ena Fero, Diana Largeteau as Laura Montanye, and Sean Jordan as Amy Clayton.

THE SECRET LANGUAGE OF VICTORY



We had a great turnout for our Code Talkers presentation on July 19, and as Ken Jones noted, it was encouraging to see so many new faces in attendance.

The program was led by Maxine Christman, who shared the fascinating, and often sobering history of the Navajo Code Talkers of World War II. She also brought a display that paired English military terms with their Navajo translations along with the literal meanings of those Navajo words offering attendees a glimpse into the language's complexity.

What stood out most was how poorly the Navajo were treated during and long after the war, despite their critical role in securing victory in the Pacific. It was a powerful reminder of the injustices Native communities have endured, even while serving their country with distinction.

The presentation sparked conversations among the audience, including personal recollections of meeting Navajo Code Talkers in years past. One attendee shared a photograph she had taken of a Code Talker enjoying a meal with fellow Code Talkers; a rare and cherished memory.

HISTORY'S HOME RUN: A DAY OF BASEBALL FUN

On Sunday, July 13, Alexandria Milne hosted Family Home Run Day, a hands-on celebration of America's pastime.




GUESSING GAMES AND GOOD TIMES

FROM DRAFTS TO A WARMER FUTURE



The days are getting shorter, the nights a little cooler, and we're busy getting everything buttoned up for the season.

Earlier this year, we sent out an SOS about our heating situation, and we were blown away by your generous donations.

One of the first improvements we made was replacing an interior door (one that had been removed years ago, located between the vestibule and the museum). Our front doors are original and beautiful, but also drafty! The new door will help seal out those drafts and keep things more comfortable inside.

We've also settled on a company to replace our existing heating system and install a ductless system in the library. In addition to providing much-needed heat, the ductless system will also dehumidify the space, helping to protect our book collection.

Along with the donations we received, funding will come from the village and from a generous contribution by Kirt Feuz to cover the remaining balance. We look forward to having the systems installed soon. They will be more efficient, provide better climate control for our books, and should result in significant cost savings for the museum.
