IN MEMORIUM, JOHN VAN DERWERKEN

John R. Van Derwerken of Route 30A, Central Bridge, passed away on October 6th, 2022 at the age of 95.

He and his wife Joan were regular attendees at the former monthly historical meetings. John had been an active member of the Board of Directors since 1997.

In 1993 the new Museum Carriage Barn exhibits were under development by his nephew Gus La Monica. John provided the barn beams, lumber, and artifacts from a former dairy barn on his farm in Central Bridge to be used in creating the exhibit space. In lieu of payment, John asked for a lifetime membership in the Historical Society. The Board granted this, and John had the distinction of being the only lifetime member of the Society.



John later served on the Town of Esperance 150th Anniversary Committee in 1996. On the passing of longtime volunteer Curator Gus La Monica, John suggested that the Carriage Barn be named in his honor which it was in 2008. In 2009 John was serving as Vice President of the Historical Society, and he was elected President the following year. The Chapel Library was constructed from remnants of the 1902 Chapel in the Esperance Cemetery during his tenure. John cut the ribbon at the grand opening in 2014.

John often recruited and suggested speakers for our Society Meetings and spoke himself on the topic of farms in the area and on S.K. Campbell and his threshing machines. John saw the transition from horsepower to tractor on the farms and worked on a threshing crew himself.

John continued to support the Historical Society as recently as May when he was interviewed for a historical documentary on the change from dairy farming in the Town of Esperance. His father Elon purchased the property in 1926 and ran a dairy operation.

Central Bridge Farms was the first farm in the county to use electricity (barns were electrified long before the house), and one of the farm tractors (Massey Harris 101 junior) was the first tractor that was self-starting on rubber tires manufactured after WWII. After taking over the farm from his father, John was a poultry and cattle farmer for 60 years.

At the peak of the poultry operation, John had over 10,000 chickens. John started a black angus herd in 1964. At the peak of operation, he ran over 200 cattle on 500 acres of land. He also was a real estate agent for 40 years.

John is survived by three children; Roger (Jacque) VanDerwerken of Escondido, CA, Alice VanDerwerken (David Sprague) of Rome, ME, and Mark VanDerwerken of Central Bridge, who lovingly cared for him. He is also survived by his daughter-in-law, Anna Trigg VanDerwerken, six grandchildren, six greatgrandchildren, numerous nieces, and nephews, including special nephew Nick Lamonica and grandnephew David Lamonica.

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Ken delighted guests with fascinating tales about the people and places in the area, painting a vivid picture of what life was like in the ages gone by. His knowledge and engaging storytelling style kept everyone entertained throughout the walk.

After the stroll, guests were invited to enjoy a bowl of soup or two, prepared by museum volunteers, at the Methodist Church. Attendees appreciated the opportunity to sit and chat while sampling six homemade soups, each as delicious as the last.

The event was a great success, showcasing the rich historical legacy of Esperance and bringing together local residents and history buffs.
