REMEMBERING BARBARA SMITH: KEEPER OF FAMILY HISTORY

Barbara (Aucompaugh) Smith, who passed away on February 25, 2025, was a beloved member of the Esperance community and a guardian of its history. Many remember her as a kind-hearted woman with a deep passion for preserving the stories of her family and the town she called home. Barbara is pictured above in the second row, third from the left, in this 1961 class photo.

Barbara and her six brothers and sisters attended the Esperance school from kindergarten through third grade before being bused to Schoharie for the remainder of their education. Her childhood in Esperance was full of small-town memories, some of which, like her friend Sandy (Palmer) Farah recalls, were unforgettable, though not always for the best reasons.

Sandy shared, "I remember that awful baseball incident where she stood too close behind the batter. The batter swung and hit her in the mouth and knocked her out cold. I talked with Barbara a few years ago about this. I can't remember if she said they took her next door to Mrs. Bellinger's house (where Reuben Bennett lives now — she was one of the two teachers at that time) or maybe to the Sheldon Jackson building, which the school used for religious education, to lie down and get medical care."

Barbara's love for history and her tireless efforts to preserve the past made her stand out. According to Ken Jones, "Barb donated many artifacts over the years to the Esperance Museum connected with her family going back generations. She was also the keeper of family stories, tracing her roots back to her grandmother, Rita Rockwell Byrne."

Neighbors kept the cemetery in good condition for many years, but when Hurricane Irene struck, it left devastation in its wake — including the cemetery.

Not one to stand by, Barbara and her husband, David Smith, took it upon themselves to clean up the cemetery, locating and restoring broken and buried gravestones. In keeping with Barbara's lifelong passion for preserving local history, her family requested that memorial contributions be made to the Esperance Historical Society.
